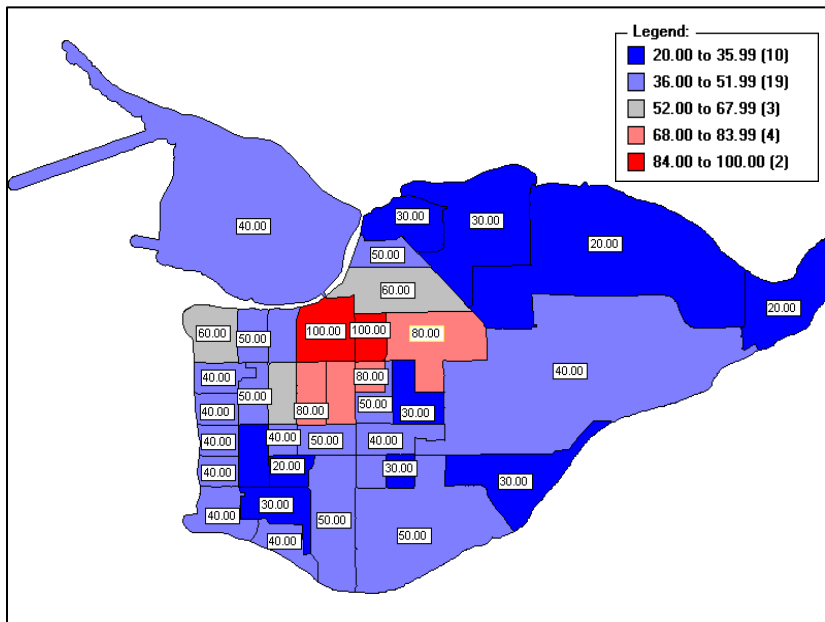

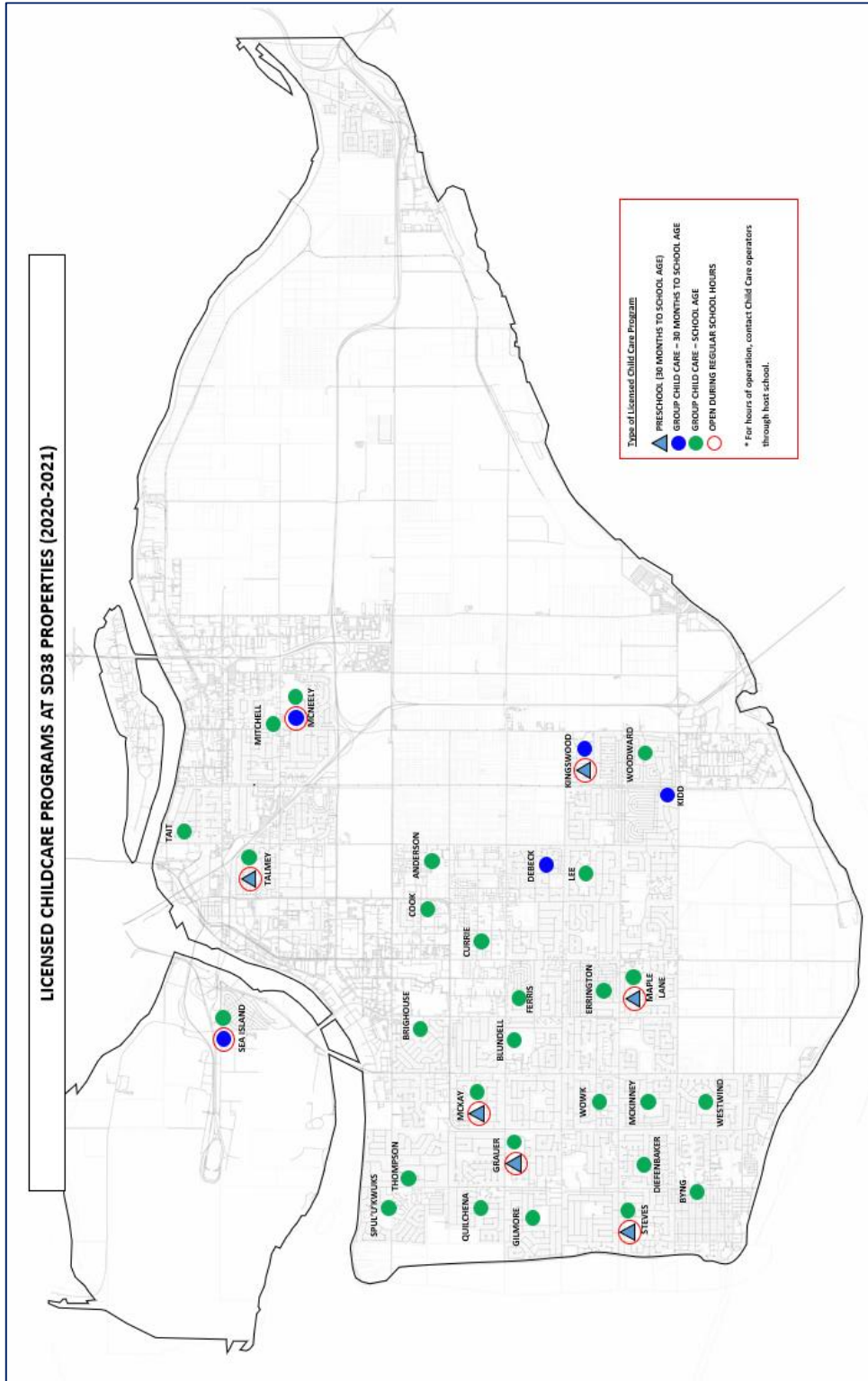

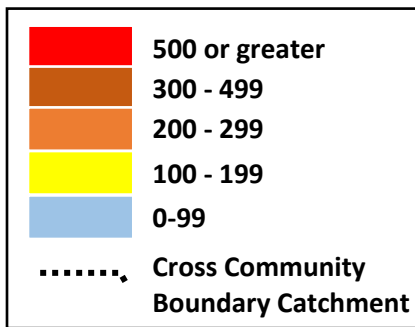
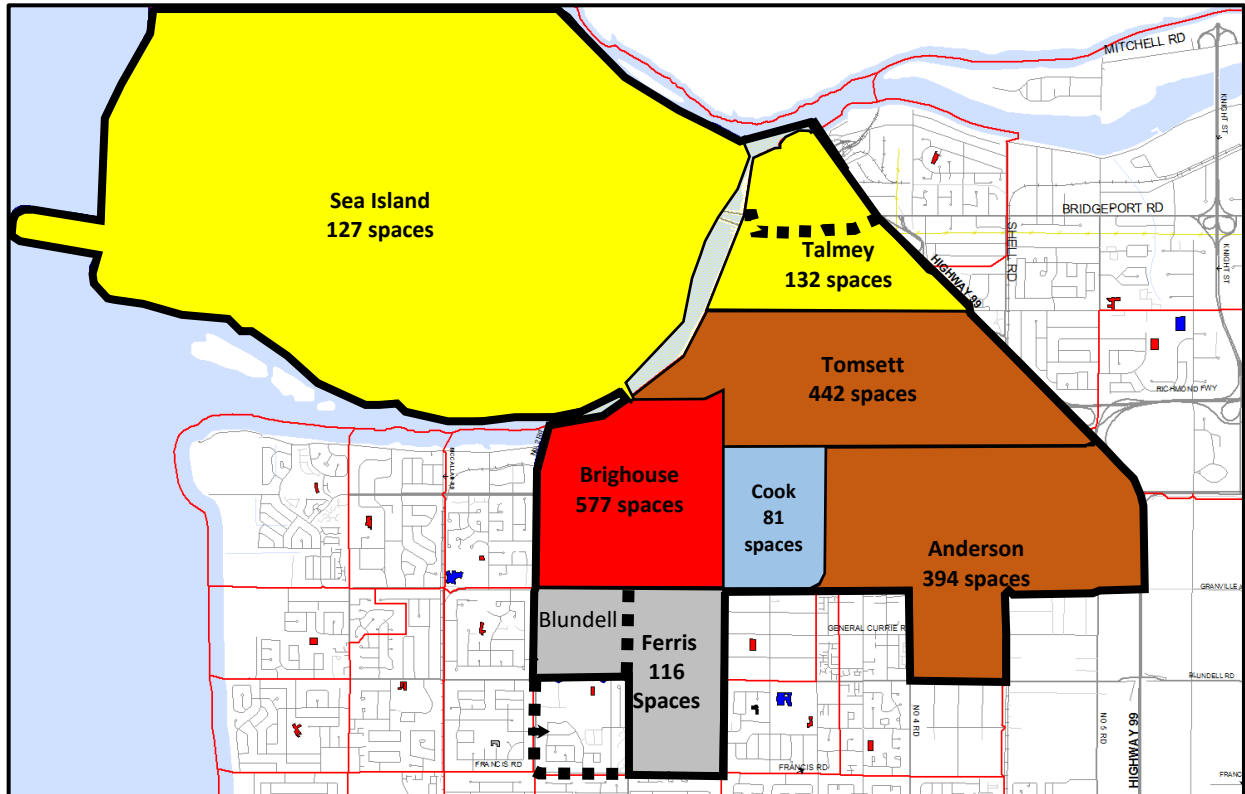
2.1 Child Care Program Type Definitions (pursuant to the Ministry of Child and Family Development):

<p><u>Preschool (30 months to School Age)</u></p>	<p><i>Preschools typically operate on the school-year (September to June). Most preschool programs run from one to four hours a day (some programs can run longer).</i></p> <p><i>Ages: From 2.5 years (30 months) to school age (Kindergarten)</i></p> <p><i>Maximum group size: 20 children</i></p> <p><i>Child-to-staff ratio:</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - 1 to 10 children: 1 Early Childhood Educator - 11 to 20 children: 1 Early Childhood Educator and 1 Early Childhood Educator Assistant <p><i>Staff qualifications:</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Early Childhood Educator Certificate (approximately 900 hours of training) - Early Childhood Educator Assistant Certificate (completed one early childhood education course) <p><i>Setting: A community-based facility or centre</i></p>

<p><u>Group Child Care (School Age)¹:</u></p>	<p><i>Ages: School age (Kindergarten and up)</i></p> <p><i>Maximum group size: 24 children from Kindergarten and Grade 1 OR 30 children from Grade 2 and older with no Kindergarten or Grade 1 children present</i></p> <p><i>Staff-to-child ratio:</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - 1 responsible adult for each 12 children from Kindergarten and Grade 1 - 1 responsible adult for each 15 children from Grade 2 and older <p><i>Staff qualifications: Responsible adults must be 19 years of age or older and able to provide care and mature guidance to children. Must also have 20 hours of child care-related training, relevant work experience, a valid first aid certificate and a clear criminal record check.</i></p> <p><i>Setting: A community-based facility or centre</i></p>

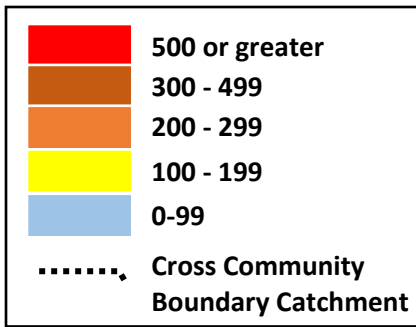

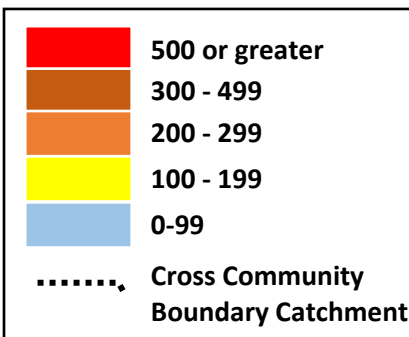

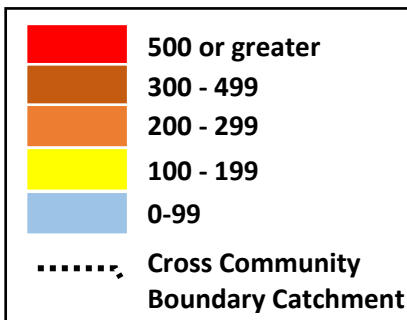
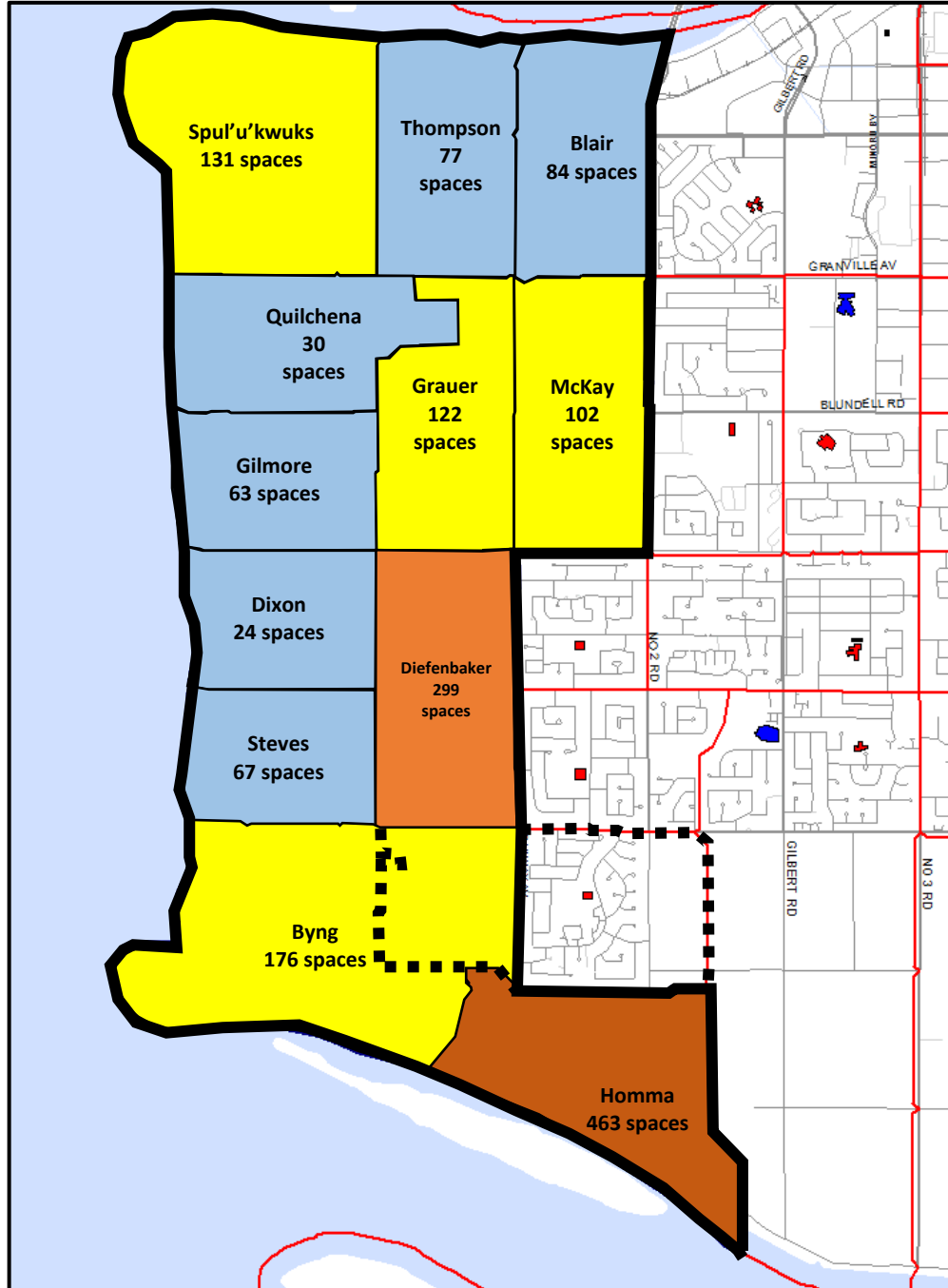
